Item #2: 1. Consideration and ACTION to approve Board of Directors Meeting Minutes for February 26, 2025. Mayor Alma Salinas made a motion to approve Meeting Minutes for February 26, 2025. Ms. Lupita Sanchez seconded the motion and upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.

Item #3: Public Comment- No Public Comment currently.

With no further comments and questions, Mayor Norma Sepulveda moved on to Item #4.

Item #4: Administration

Mr. Cruz began by stating, "Yes, ma'am, for consideration is the ratification of the Executive Committee's action on the following item: approval of the Homeland Security Roger Committee's prioritization list and resolution for the FY 2025-26 Homeland Security Grant Division regional grant application. Due to the tight deadline set by the state, we had to convene the Executive Committee. We received confirmation on March 14th that HSAC had met, and by the week of March 17th, the Executive Committee had unanimously approved the FY 2025-26 prioritization list as presented by HSAC. Following that, staff submitted and uploaded the list to the state grant management system, meeting the deadline of March 19th. We are now asking the committee to approve the action previously taken by the Executive Committee. I will entertain a motion.

4A. Consideration Ratification of Executive Committee Action on the following.

4.A.1. Consideration and Action to Approve Homeland Security Advisory Committee (HSAC) Prioritized Lists and resolution for FY 2025-26 Homeland Security Grants Division Regional Grant Applications. Commissioner Pete Garcia made a motion to Approve Homeland Security Advisory Committee (HSAC) Prioritized Lists and Resolution for FY 2025-26 Homeland Security Grants Division Regional Grant Applications. Jim Darling seconded the motion and upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.

With no further questions or comments, Mayor Norma Sepulveda then moved on to Item B on the agenda.

Executive Report: Mr. Cruz Started off by introducing and welcoming Commissioner Lopez that took Commissioner Garza spot & for his first time attending the meeting. Mr. Cruz then moved on to introduce all LRGVDC New Hires.

Item 2: Updates on Regional News, Funding Opportunities, Training, and Legislative Items

The report was provided in advance for review. As stated in the report, this legislative session has seen an overwhelming number of bills, breaking records. This report is about a week and a half old, and since then, many bills have already been assigned to various committees. Some of the key bills that may positively impact the State of Texas, and the Council of Governments include:

House Bill 13: This bill creates the Texas Interoperable Council, which will focus on addressing interoperable communication and the development of statewide strategic plans for governing the interoperability of emergency communication equipment and infrastructure across Texas.

House Bill 150: Establishes the Texas Cyber Command, in response to the increasing number of cyberattacks, such as phishing emails and other security threats. Our office has taken numerous actions to address these issues, and we have a partnership with the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley (UTRGV) cybersecurity department to assist with any cybersecurity matters. Cities and counties are encouraged to reach out for support and resources from local and state agencies. **Senate Bill 2860**: This bill relates to the emergency service fee collected by wireless service providers. It is another attempt by the Texas 9-1-1 Alliance to increase the 50-cent fee for 9-1-1 services, especially given the rise of digital 9-1-1 services and the associated costs. Although the bill has not been assigned to a committee yet, there is optimism for its passage.

Senate Bill 480: This bill authorizes local government entities to participate in water planning and funding activities, which includes regional councils of government and political subdivisions of the state.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 13: This resolution addresses the 1944 Water Treaty with Mexico and urges the federal government to push Mexico to deliver its fair share of water. The estimated loss to South Texas is \$993 million per year. This resolution is largely symbolic but highlights ongoing efforts to resolve water-related issues.

House Concurrent Resolution 101: A humorous but noteworthy resolution aimed at changing the New York State "strip" to a "Texas strip." It provides a light-hearted addition to the legislative session.

Regarding funding opportunities:

The **Regional Mitigation Program**, in partnership with the General Land Office (GLO), has announced approximately \$97.6 million for approved regional mitigation projects. Counties or cities must have an approved mitigation action plan to be eligible for hazard mitigation grant funds under the GLO.

The **Southwest Border Regional Commission** has made approximately \$11.3 million available. This funding supports infrastructure, workforce development, business entrepreneurship, and community development. Further details on eligibility and investment areas are provided in the report.

Mr. Jim Darling then asked; All the EPA staff have been let go, and I'm not sure how we can move forward with these projects when the entities that usually handle them have been significantly reduced. Have you received any updates on this situation? Mr. Cruz then answers, no, we're still waiting for further guidance. As you know, most of our funding comes from federal and state sources, with some state funds that are passed through by the federal government. To date, this situation hasn't impacted us. We haven't received any updates yet, particularly from the Economic Development Administration (EDA). They're still awaiting further guidance, especially on the topic of DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion), which is still part of the EDA's focus until further guidance is provided by EDA. Jim Darling stated we're waiting for more information, particularly regarding the Border 2025 project, and whether it will move forward. There was supposed to be a meeting last Friday.

Mr. Jim Darling then added that the people conducting the meeting had been replaced or let go from their positions.

Mr. Cruz responded, "I believe TCEQ conducts those meetings, so we haven't received any updates from them either."

Commissioner Pete Garcia then asked if the LRGVDC had its own grant writer.

Mr. Cruz replied, "Typically, the program directors who head the departments also handle the grant writing process for their programs. The only department that assists cities with not necessarily grant writing, but technical assistance is our Economic Development department, led by Melissa and her team of three. While we don't have an internal grant writer, we do help in identifying and disseminating grants. Most of our grants are recurring with annual allocations. We make sure that grant opportunities are communicated to the relevant departments, like law enforcement, fire, and EMS. I also forward information to the board of directors whenever funding opportunities arise.

No questions or comments, Mayor Norma Sepulveda then moved on to Item #5 Department Reports.

Item #5: A. Community & Economic Development: Melisa Gonzalez had 2 Action items on the agenda for her department.

1. Consideration and Action to Approve resolution 2025-01 Proclaiming April as National Fair Housing Month and Supporting the Awareness of Fair Housing. *Mr. Troy Allen made a motion to Approve Resolution 2025-01 Proclaiming April as National Fair Housing Month and Supporting the Awareness of Fair Housing. Commissioner Ellie Torres seconded the motion, upon a vote; the motion was carried out unanimously.*

Yesterday, my Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC) approved the CEDS plans, with two key additions. First, we decided to include additional letters to our objectives, and second, we added a section on foreign trade information. The difference between the version you received and the one we're asking you to approve is that the updated version includes objectives labeled A, B, and C, along with a page dedicated to foreign trade details.

Mr. Cruz has already circulated some information about this, but what I need from you today is approval of these changes and the plan. Once approved, we'll submit the plan to the EDA. After they review and approve it, we can officially promote it to the region.

Regarding DEI, Mr. Cruz mentioned it earlier, but we haven't received any official guidance from the EDA on that matter. We're anticipating that if they're not satisfied with the wording related to DEI, they will send the plan back for revisions. As of now, we're following the previous guidance from EDA, which advised us to remove any DEI language. I'm optimistic that the plan will be approved, but if it's not, I will return to the EDAC, update the wording, and bring it back to the board for approval, along with any changes required by the EDA

2. Consideration and Action to Approve the LRGVDC Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). Jim Darling made a motion to approve the LRGVDC Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). Ron Mills seconded the motion upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Cruz then reminded everyone that this initiative falls under the Economic Development Administration (EDA). He noted that when opportunities arise, we make sure to disseminate the information, with Melissa and her team providing technical assistance. He emphasized that this plan will be a valuable tool because any application submitted to the EDA must reference the goals and objectives it's targeting. If the application includes these goals, it will carry more weight, and attaching a letter of support from our organization will further strengthen it.

Status Reports: Mrs. Gonzales shared a few announcements. Tomorrow, we will be hosting STC4, our Clean Cities Apprenticeship Coalition workshop, from 10 AM onward. During this meeting, we'll be working with our members to finalize their bylaws, membership structure, and meeting schedules. Once that's complete, I'll bring it to the board for final approval.

Lastly, Mrs. Gonzales announced that our tire recycling event, "Road to Recycling," is scheduled for Wednesday, April 23rd. We're trying a Wednesday this time to see how successful it is. Currently, 31 entities are registered for the event, and we hope to have the locations for these entities posted on our website by Monday.

No further questions or comments, Mayor Norma Sepulveda moved on to B Health and Human Services.

B. Health & Human Services: Margarita Lopez had 2 Action Items on the agenda.

Ms. Margarita Lopez started off with, in accordance with the AAA LRGVDC direct purchase of service contractor application for fiscal year 2025, any requests for rate changes were required to be submitted by February 28th. We have received several rate change requests, and as per the timeline, these changes must be presented to you today. If approved, they will take effect on April 1st.

- 1. Consideration and Action to Approve Vendor Arise Home Health Care, Inc request for Amend contract rates from \$12.59 to \$15.59 an hour. **Ron Mills made a motion to approve Vendor Arise home Health Care, Inc request to Amend contract rates from \$12.59 to \$15.59 an hour. Ron Mills made a motion to approve the Vendor, A Healing Touch Home Health request to Amend contract Rates. The agency proposes adjusting the homemaker service from \$17.50 to \$15.00 and caregiver respite from \$18.50 to \$15.00. Commissioner Ellie Torres seconded the motion, upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.

Status Reports: Ms. Margarita Lopez mentioned that if there were any questions her report was attached to the packet provided.

No further questions or comments Mayor Norma Sepulveda moved on to Public Safety.

C. Public Safety: Criminal Justice & Homeland Security. Mr. Cesar Merla was recognized and mentioned that he had 1 action item on the agenda.

C1. Consideration and Action to approve the appointed Frank Garcia, Criminal Justice Advisory Committee (CJAC) Member. *Commissioner Ellie Torres made a motion to approve the Appointed Frank Garcia Criminal Justice Committee (CJAC) Member. Commissioner Ernie Garcia seconded the motion, upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.*

Mr. Merla mentioned that Frank Garcia is now replacing Dr. Benjamin Clinton, who previously held a position with Raymondville ISD in Willacy County, After Dr. Clinton moved to Mercedes, the committee's sole recommendation and the only candidate they saw fit for the role was Mr. Frank Garcia.

Status Reports: Mr. Cesar Merla started with; my report is attached for your review. I would like to briefly highlight a point Mr. Cruz raised about cybersecurity. Recently, we held a Cyber Disruption Workshop at the end of February, and it was very informative. We received the preliminary reports just yesterday. My team and I will be working closely with RSOC (UTRGV) and DIR to enhance cybersecurity efforts in the region. Several entities, including municipalities and a major hospital, have been affected. A key takeaway is that often, cybersecurity issues are caused by the actions of individuals behind the computer, not the technology itself. Please share this with your jurisdictions to help raise awareness.

THIRA Report: Our THIRA (Threat Hazard Identification Risk Assessment) received a perfect score of 47 out of 47 points, the first time since its implementation. If you would like a copy for your review or for any pending considerations, please contact Mr. Cruz or me, and we will share it with you. This achievement reflects our region's growing importance both within the state and nationally.

Clarification of Acronym: Mr. Merla clarified that THIRA stands for Threat Hazard Identification Risk Assessment, which identifies major threats, including cybersecurity. The report also includes the Stakeholder Preparedness Report (SPR) and the Implementation Plan (IP). These documents are required

for any jurisdiction applying for Homeland Security funding. If you need a copy to review, please let us know.

Training Opportunity: We are hosting a collaboration with TEEX for a Basic Criminal Investigation Course at our Valley Metro location from April 21st to 25th. This one-week training course will be beneficial for those interested in criminal investigation.

Listo RGV Conference: Don't forget to save the date for the upcoming Listo RGV conference. The list of speakers is complete, focusing on mental health and emergency response. The early registration fee is still \$75, but it will increase to \$100 after April 18th, so please reserve your spot soon. The conference will once again be held at Margaritaville Hotel in South Padre Island.

No further questions or comments Mayor Norma Sepulveda moved on to LRGV Police Academy.

C.2 LRGV Police Academy: Mr. Javier Solis had an Action Item on the Agenda.

1. Consideration and Action to approve the Utilization of LRGV Academy GPI funds in the amount of \$54,858.00 for the purpose of a 2025 Chevrolet Silverado. **Ron Mills made a motion to approve the Utilization of LRGV Academy GPI funds in the amount of \$54,858.00 for the purpose of a 2025 Chevrolet Silverado. Mayor Alma Salinas seconded the motion, upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.**

Mr. Solis mentioned that the Academy requires the replacement of aging vehicles in our police driving fleet, which is essential for the Basic Peace Officer Course curriculum. The purchase of this new vehicle would serve a dual purpose: it would help supplement our current fleet, providing the necessary vehicles for training, and it would also be used to transport heavy equipment between sites. Currently, we lack a vehicle capable of managing this task. We respectfully request your consideration and approval of the GPI funds to support this purchase.

Status Reports: We offered a total of six in-service courses and trained 66 officers during the month. The total contact hours for February were 2,124. I also have a training announcement: From April 21st to 24th, we will be hosting Crisis Intervention Training at the Center for Education and Economic Development in the City of Mission. This training is designed to equip Valley law enforcement officers with the necessary skills to effectively respond to, recognize, and manage incidents involving individuals in mental crisis. The training is open to all law enforcement agencies in the Rio Grande Valley, and we are currently accepting registrations. If anyone is interested, please feel free to sign up.

No further questions or comments Mayor Norma Sepulveda moved on to the Rio Grande Valley Emergency Communication District.

Status Reports: Mr. Dennis Moreno started off with no action items on Agenda. Mr. Moreno also stated that Department status reports were attached to the packet provided. We cover a variety of areas, including GIS, IT, and the infrastructure for 911 call routing, as well as our public community engagement division. I want to draw your attention to a flyer I have here, which is also displayed on your screen. It's titled *Save the Date*, and it's for our third annual wellness seminar, scheduled for Tuesday, September 30th, 2025. Last year, we had around 400 attendees, and this event is free of charge. It's open to all public safety personnel, as well as yourselves, and will offer a full day of activities for our first responders. Please mark your calendars!

Additionally, I'd like to highlight that National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week will take place from April 14th to April 20th. This week is dedicated to honoring our 911 telecommunicators, who are essential first responders. They play a critical role by providing vital information to ensure an effective emergency response. We'll be recognizing their hard work and dedication throughout that week. These are two important events coming up, and one is specifically for your personnel, so please take a moment to acknowledge their vital contributions to public safety.

Mr. Cruz then wanted to mention that there was another conference coming up, the Texas NENA Public Safety Conference, which will be held from April 2nd to April 5th. This conference focuses on telecommunicators and public safety, and it will take place at the McAllen Convention Center. This is the first time the event is being held in South Texas. It's a statewide conference, so it's an excellent opportunity for networking and learning across Texas. Commissioner Torres also reminded everyone that the South Texas All Hazards Conference was also taking place right now at teh McAllen Convention Center.

No questions or comments, Mayor Norma Sepulveda proceeded to Item D Valley Metro.

D. Transportation Valley Metro: Mr. Tom states that today he will have 2 action items on the agenda.

D.1. Consideration and Action on approval of resolution #2025-03, authorizing the acceptance of MCI Coach Busses to be transferred from Green Mountain Transit to Valley Metro. Commissioner Ellie Torres made a motion to approve Resolution #2025-03, authorizing the acceptance of MCI Coach Busses to be transferred from Green Mountain Transit to Valley Metro. Ron Mill seconded the motion, upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Tom Logan then mentioned that this resolution is a formal request, in line with FTA policies and procedures, to transfer seven MCI coaches from GMT to LRGVDC Valley Metro. These coaches are no longer needed by GMT due to changes in post-COVID travel demand, which have significantly reduced commuter ridership on their system. We plan to use these buses for our express routes connecting Brownsville, Harlingen, McAllen, and Edinburg. Additionally, they will serve as part of our contingency fleet for mass evacuations, special events, and the upcoming football season, which is expected to bring large crowds to various events and festivals. For example, this past weekend at the Onion Fest in Weslaco, we successfully transported nearly 2,000 people between the park-and-ride locations and the venue, and both attendees and the city were very pleased with our service. The only costs involved will be transportation fees and the expenses related to inspecting and preparing the buses for use.

Mr. Cruz then added that compared to the current prices of new buses, these are a bargain buses with a remaining long lifespan. They are barely broken in, with around 200,000 miles on them, whereas new buses can cost anywhere from five hundred thousand to over a million dollars. Then mentions that regarding the football season, we've already had discussions with UTRGV, as they are expecting many attendees, over 20,000 particularly for their first football game and can only accommodate 2000 parking spaces. We hope to have these buses ready, or if not, we will utilize our current fleet to transport people from parking areas to the football field.

Mr. Tom Logan also mentioned that it was interesting that UTRGV staff requested seven high-capacity buses, specifically 57-passenger buses with wheelchair accessibility. As it turns out, this agency is offering seven buses, and we were fortunate to be first in line to receive them. There are many others behind us, so we want to ensure we secure these buses for our use. Then Commissioner Pete Garcia states on behalf of the City of Weslaco, we would like to thank you for your excellent service during the Onion Fest. We truly appreciate your support as part of the committee, and we may need your assistance again for the Fourth of July celebration.

D.2. Consideration and Action to approve Expansion and renovation expenses in relation to TX-2010-125, Harlingen Cares Act at 100% federal funding with no local match. **Ron Mills made a motion to approve Expansion and Renovation expenses in relation to TX-2010-125, Harlingen Cares Act to 100% federal funding with no local match. Troy Allen seconded the motion, upon a vote; the motion was carried unanimously.**

Mr. Tom Logan then states that Valley Metro is seeking board approval for building network installation expenses under this grant, which cover 100% of the costs. This network system consists of a combination of hardware and software components designed to enable communication, data transfer, and resource sharing between devices such as computers, cameras, and servers. The equipment will be installed in our new facility in Harlingen, located in the former AEP building. We're retrofitting this building to serve as our

Harlingen terminal, and we're just 30 days away from getting it up and running. We're very excited to bring this new terminal to the heart of Harlingen, right at the crossroads.

Status Reports: Mr. Tom Logan starts off, first and foremost, I want to thank my staff for their hard work. This was a competitive grant, and after submitting our proposal, the state awarded us funds to expand our demand response service from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The grant also supports two new commuter routes: one from Willacy County to the City of Harlingen, and the other from Zapata to the City of Laredo. We're currently in the process of launching these routes, which will operate Monday through Friday as an extension of our Metro Express service. This means that people from Willacy County will be able to transfer to Metro Express and travel to destinations like Brownsville, South Padre Island, McAllen, Edinburg, and other cities along the way. We've received tremendous support from Raymondville, and I want to thank the City of Raymondville Commissioner for helping spread the word and for assisting us in organizing a ribbon-cutting ceremony on April 9th at 10 a.m. You will receive formal invitations, but I'd love for you to mark your calendars and join us for the event.

Next, A big thank you to the City of Harlingen for making this possible, including securing the land for the future terminal. Those 12 acres will play a key role in advancing public transportation in our region. This is a significant achievement, and we're incredibly excited about the future of public transportation here. This is a big win for our region.

Moving on, Mr. Tom Logan moved on to the next item on agenda, March 18th was National Transit Employee Appreciation Day, and we want to take this opportunity to thank every single one of our transit employees. They do an outstanding job, not only maintaining and ensuring our buses are reliable, but also providing customer information and support. A special thanks goes to the drivers who are out there every day, as well as the dedicated administrative staff behind the scenes. To show our appreciation, we handed out bags, thanks to the help of our 911 division. There are over 100 hardworking transit employees at Valley Metro, and their commitment is truly appreciated. The giveaways were a great way to recognize their efforts, and we're grateful for everything they do.

Lastly, Mr. Tom Logan mentions that The City of McAllen, through McAllen Metro, hosted the annual Texas Transit Association Conference, Rodeo Competition, and Expo at their convention center, and it was a huge success. Over 500 attendees from across the state participated in the event.

I'm especially proud of our maintenance division, who represented us, the COG, and Valley Metro exceptionally well. We had two teams competing: the heavy-duty maintenance division and the light-duty maintenance division. Thanks to the leadership of Mr. James Campbell, I'm thrilled to share that our light-duty team placed third at the state level, just behind Austin's Capital Metro and the San Antonio area's Swartz. This is a significant milestone for us, as it's the first time we've competed in the maintenance category, and we earned third place.

No further Questions or comments, Mayor Norma Sepulveda then moved to Rio Grande Valley MPO.

RGVMPO was not able to attend the meeting. No status reports for them currently.



Program Status Reports

• Economic Development Administration

The LRGVDC is soliciting nominations for EDAC committee members to serve in the following categories: (2) Special EDO. The purpose of the advisory committee is to educate, promote, foster, and coordinate community and regional planning efforts on economic development in the Rio Grande Valley, and other social impacts of existing, new or proposed regulations, policies, and control regarding economic development. The advisory committee will provide advocacy, guidance, technical assistance, and information to the LRGVDC Board on priority matters of economic development. If you have any questions about the nominations process or committee, please contact Melisa Gonzales-Rosas. Nomination forms need to be emailed to <u>vramos@lrgvdc.org</u>.

Staff have been working on updating the Regional Comprehensive Economic Development strategies (CEDS) since July 2024. The CEDS were updated and presented to the LRGVDC board for approval in March 2025. The CEDS were board approved and submitted to the Economic Development Administration (EDA) by the March 30th, 2025 deadline. The CEDS are currently being reviewed by EDA and we will inform the LRGVDC board once they are approved and ready for regional promotion.

Staff have engaged with city officials to explore potential EDA projects, providing valuable insights that will assist in the preparation of applications for submission. Additionally, we have shared useful resources and tips to facilitate their registration in the new EDA EDGE portal for those interested in applying for EDA funding.

Staff are currently administering the Harlingen Economic Development Corporation's EDA award project, which involves the development of approximately 5.3 acres designated for a detention pond. This project will include the construction of roughly 1,130 square yards of parking lot area and approximately 320 linear feet of drainage piping. Additionally, a foot-hike and bike trail extending around 2,900 linear feet will be integrated around the pond. It is anticipated that this project will generate approximately 300 jobs and retain around 115 positions, with an estimated private investment of \$4 million.



<u>Solid Waste Management Program</u>



The Lower Rio Grande Valley Development Council (LRGVDC) proudly hosted the 8th Annual Road to Recycling Event on Wednesday, April 23, 2025. Staff members visited various collection sites, witnessing the power of community engagement. We are thrilled to announce that this regional initiative was a outstanding success, with participation from 18 cities and 3 counties, showcasing a collective spirit across 30 entities. As we compile the results of tires collected and recycled, we look forward to sharing these achievements with the community. More information to come!

Staff continue to work on the draft tire ordinance that is being created for the region. Once the details are finalized, the ordinance will be submitted to the LRGVDC Board for approval.

Staff submitted the Semi-Annual Report #3 on the Solid Waste grant to TCEQ and submitted the progress report for the Solid Waste Infrastructure for Recycling (SWIFR) program. The update is as follows: the participating schools include Mission, Raymondville, Los Fresnos, Mercedes ISD, and Rio Hondo. Due to a delayed start with some schools, the completion timeline for this task has been adjusted. Additionally, an upcoming challenge is the commencement of state testing, which is currently requiring schools to focus their efforts on preparing students. Region One plans to convene with the teachers in April for a planning meeting. The development of curriculum will be discussed with the objective of fully implementing the program by September 2025.

The next Virtual Solid Waste Advisory Committee meeting will be on June 10, 2025, at 2:00 PM via GoToMeeting platform.

Staff continue to provide technical assistance, outreach, and monitoring for all Solid Waste Projects. Information about the Solid Waste program is available at www.lrgvdc.org/solidwaste.html.

• Air Quality Program

The Rider 7 PM 2.5 Local Air Quality project has officially commenced and is currently in progress. The following next steps are being undertaken as part of the project: 1) Developing stationary source PM2.5 and PM2.5 precursor emission inventories for Hidalgo and Cameron Counties, 2) Analyzing available ambient air monitoring data in Hidalgo and Cameron Counties for current and historical PM2.5, 3) Developing a stationary source PM2.5 air dispersion modeling inventory for Hidalgo and Cameron Counties, 4) Preparing and submitting draft and final reports summarizing the work generated from the study.

Project progress to date: The consultant, ALL4 reviewed TCEQ's New Source Review (NSR) database, the State of Texas Air Reporting System (STARS), U.S. EPA's Clean Air Markets Program Database (CAMPD), and the National Emissions Inventory (NEI) to identify all permitted facilities within Hidalgo and Cameron Counties. Additionally, they have received the Air Permits Allowable Database (APAD) data and have begun to review/supplement this data with information retrieved from TCEQ's Central File Room Online (CFRO). For permits and sources that were not included in APAD, and APAD sources without emissions rates or stack parameters, a review of electronic files in the CFRO is being conducted to fill in data gaps to have a complete model-ready emissions inventory. In addition, ALL4 acquired comprehensive meteorological data to facilitate thorough review and analysis within the framework of the modeling protocol. ALL4 downloaded 5 years of pre-processed meteorological data (January 1, 2017 - December 31, 2021) from TCEQ for the McAllen International Airport meteorological station. As part of the data analysis, ALL4 is reviewing the data for completeness and conducting quality assurance before using the data in modeling iterations.

Staff will maintain ongoing oversight of this project, actively collaborating with the consulting firm, ALL4 LLC. This partnership will ensure that all project requirements are consistently met as stipulated by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and will continue to regularly communicate monthly with representatives from TCEQ regarding this project.

• South Texas Clean Cities & Communities Coalition (STC4)

On March 27, 2025, at 10:00 AM, staff hosted a productive workshop with members of STC4 to develop draft bylaws. This workshop was instrumental in establishing the coalition's structure and governance, ensuring that all foundational elements are properly aligned to support its ongoing endeavors and initiatives. The collaborative spirit and strategic planning evident during this initial meeting will assuredly serve as a strong foundation for the coalition's future achievements. The bylaws are scheduled for finalization and approval at the following meeting, further solidifying our framework for advancement.

• Water Quality Program

Staff remain dedicated to facilitating meetings with water investors to support innovative water projects aimed at addressing the region's drought needs. We continue to conduct several introductory meetings to engage local stakeholders, including water board members, drainage and irrigation districts, and water producers, to explore potential projects and provide necessary outreach. Through these efforts we were able to bring a proposal for a Solar Thermal Desalination project by Desolenator, a global company who have completed projects in Africa, Abu Dabhi, and Dubai to help fix their water issues and needs, to Cameron County specifically to their Economic Development Departments Ramiro Aleman. We have all met continuously since their introduction in January of 2024 and they are currently working on their MOA to finalize an agreement to begin this innovative project. The aim of this project is to secure sustainable water while simultaneously developing a skilled local workforce and stimulating economic growth through manufacturing partnerships. The system they are proposing to Cameron County is an SP40 unit which is capable of producing 40m3 (10,567 gallons) of freshwater per hour, achieving up to 1,000 m3/day (264,172 gallons) from saline water sources, utilizing both PVT and Geothermal energy. They are proposing 1-4 SP40 units, targeting a production capacity of 10,000,000 gallons per day within a decade. Desolenator also provides an integrated Zero-Liquid Discharge (ZLD) system. Unlike traditional desalination methods that produce environmentally harmful brine, their ZLD module eliminates brine discharge, transforming it into solid salts. The ZLD system eliminates harmful brine discharge, protecting local fisheries and ecosystems. Desolenator has also met with Ronald Mills, the executive port director of Port Mansfield and are also working on an MOA to build a smaller version of the system that was proposed to Cameron County.

Staff received instructor led GIS training on March 17-18 provided by the 911 GIS department and assistant director Jose Garcia. This training will help staff learn how to create and understand GIS Mapping and apply it to current projects such as the Flood infrastructure Funds (FIF), TWDB Project No. 40038 and future projects.

Staff continue to actively educate the public on water quality issues through a variety of outreach initiatives. Monthly themed Facebook posts are created to engage our online community, encouraging users to give a thumbs up or leave a comment. These posts are designed to raise awareness about water quality topics and provide valuable information to the public. Beyond social media, our outreach efforts extend to in-person events. Staff members attend these events either independently or in collaboration with other LRGVDC departments and external organizations. These events offer excellent opportunities to promote the Community & Economic Development (C&ED) program and connect with the community. At these events, we distribute informational reading materials and promotional items related to water quality.

Staff continue to regularly communicate with representatives from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) as well as other entities involved in water quality initiatives to strengthen partnerships and generate further activities related to water quality and to highlight the importance of it to the region. • Rio Grande Regional Water Planning Group (Region M)

The Region M meeting is scheduled for May 7, 2025. Meeting continues to be held hybrid at the LRGVDC Ken Jones Board Room and via GoToMeeting.

The Rio Grande Regional Water Planning Group (RGRWPG) approved and adopted the Initially Prepared Plan (IPP) for the Rio Grande 2026 Regional Water Plan on February 5, 2025. The Lower Rio Grande Valley Development Council (LRGVDC), as the designated political subdivision approved by the RGRWPG, submitted the IPP to the TWDB for review on March 3, 2025. The Rio Grande Regional Water Planning area encompasses Cameron, Hidalgo, Jim Hogg, Maverick, Starr, Webb, Willacy, and Zapata Counties.


• GIS Division






• 9-1-1 | Information Technology

The LRGVDC Valley Metro is requesting the board's approval on the recommended selection for contractual services from Araiza General Construction, LLC based on the Project Tally and Evaluation of bids performed by the Project Evaluation Committee for the construction of the Edinburg Transit Terminal Office Building 1st Floor Finish-out, Phase III.

Project Location: 617 W University Dr, Edinburg, TX 78539 Project Size: 4,133 Sq. Ft.

The project consists of a 4,133 Sq. Ft. interior build-out of the first floor LRGVDC Valley Metro Edinburg Transit Terminal Office Building which will be the new Edinburg Economic Development Corporation offices. Build-out will include office spaces, meeting rooms, restrooms, and a breakroom. The scope of work includes but is not limited to demolition, framing, drywall installation, flooring, ceiling finishes, painting, door and window installation, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, finishes (cabinetry, counter-tops, lighting), and final clean-up.

Project Location: 201 N T Street Harlingen, TX 78596 **Project Type:** HVAC Replacement of one (1) 15-ton split unit and one (1) 7.5-ton unit.

This project, funded through a Federal Transit Administration (FTA) grant TX-2020-125, is to procure the services from Terra Cooling via a BuyBoard purchasing cooperative contract, 720-23 HVAC Equipment, Supplies, and Installation of HVAC Equipment, with a total of <u>\$48,454.87</u>.

The LRGVDC Valley Metro is requesting the Board's approval to address the urgent need to restore climate control capabilities of the recently acquired new Harlingen Terminal property's main office building designated as Building "A" which has been vacant for several years now. During this prolonged period of not being used, the existing HVAC systems have significantly deteriorated and are no longer fully operational.

Building "A" will support the new Harlingen Valley Metro terminal operations, and in its current state, it does not meet the necessary health, safety, or functional standards required for occupancy. Restoration of a reliable climate control system is critical to ensure the facility is suitable for staff use and public access.

The project involves the complete removal of outdated HVAC units and the installation of modern 7.5-ton and 15-ton systems, along with all supporting electrical, plumbing, and ductwork integration. These upgrades are essential to reactivating the facility and enabling it to fulfill its intended role as the new Valley Metro Terminal.

• Ridership Report

From September through March, a total of 545,790 rides were reported across four transit agencies.

- **UTRGV** led with the highest ridership, accounting for 351,861 rides
- Valley Metro has reported 189,295 rides.
- **STC** and **TSTC** reported significantly lower numbers, with 3,687 and 947 rides respectively.

Ridership peaked in October at 113,146 rides, then gradually declined during the winter months, reaching a low in December before rebounding in February. The data reflects strong student and regional transit activity, particularly driven by UTRGV and Valley Metro services.

Regional Transportation Advisory Panel (RTAP) Activity:

RTAP Committee held a meeting on April 08, 2025, and discussed the following:

During the meeting, members addressed key topics including attendance and participation, received an update on the 5-Year Regional Public Transportation Coordination Plan (RPTCP) for 2027–2031, and heard reports from RTAP subcommittees. The committee was also briefed on the Regional Mobility Advisory Committee (RMAC) and its efforts related to Regional Transit Authority research and designation. Transit providers from across the region—including B-Metro, Island Metro, Metro McAllen, STC-Jag Express, UTRGV-Vaquero Express, and Valley Metro—shared updates on their services. The meeting concluded with an open forum for new and old business, offering members a chance to exchange ideas and address ongoing priorities.

Attendance and Participation Discussion

- Nancy Sanchez addressed the ongoing attendance issues among RTAP committee members, identifying specific agencies with repeated absences.
- The committee agreed to update member contact information and consider sending formal letters to those who have exceeded the allowable number of absences.
- There was also a broader discussion about outreach to new organizations to encourage broader participation and representation on the committee.

RPTCP Update

- Claudia Olmedo presented updates on the five-year Regional Public Transportation Coordination Plan (RPTCP) for 2027–2031.
- She shared insights from the Bold Eagle planning mission, noting challenges such as limited funding and the importance of stronger collaboration among transportation agencies.
- Claudia announced Valley Metro's \$200,000 funding application, with potential allocations anticipated for June 2025.

UTRGV and GO-PASS Collaboration

- John Ray Bocanegra highlighted a potential collaboration between UTRGV and GO-PASS, where UTRGV could purchase student passes to grant them free access to transit services.
- This initiative is aimed at easing student transportation burdens and could provide benefits to local employers.

Subcommittee Reports

- Claudia Olmedo (RTAP Subcommittee) emphasized the need for direct engagement with transportation systems to better understand passenger experiences.
- Laurie L. Gonzalez shared insights from her work with individuals with disabilities, pointing out varied barriers based on location and need. She proposed developing case studies to gain deeper understanding.

Transit Provider Updates

- Simon Ortiz (B-Metro) reported a decline in ridership from December to January, potentially linked to administrative shifts and public perception. Paratransit ridership held steady. He noted:
 - The Downtown Circular service was launched successfully and remains free.
 - The Jose Colunga project is nearing completion.
 - Expressed participation in the TTA Roadeo and strong driver performance.
 - He plans to coordinate with Leonel Vela to share the Circular route info via the community calendar.
- Bart Perez (SPI) observed a similar ridership dip, possibly influenced by administrative changes and social media narratives. Spring Break ridership leaned more family-oriented than student-based.
- Jon Ray Bocanegra (Metro McAllen) reported a change to Route 8, now looping to new apartments in response to community feedback. He also:
 - Highlighted the need for a service coordination meeting with Valley Metro due to space constraints at the bus station.
 - \circ $\,$ Noted continued updates to the mobile app and ongoing work on transitoriented development plans.
- Tom Logan (UTRGV) announced an upcoming double-decker bus demo, citing challenges like limited parking during the football season. He mentioned working with a consultant to improve regional transit planning.
- Nancy Sanchez (Valley Metro) promoted the Willacy Express Ribbon Cutting Ceremony, set for April 9, 2025, in Raymondville. She emphasized the goal of improving rural mobility, particularly in Zapata County, to aid individuals with disabilities and stimulate local economies.
- Tom Logan (Valley Metro) provided an update on the Edinburg Terminal project, announcing that four proposals were received and met budget requirements. The firstfloor finish-out, supported by the EDC, is expected to conclude in 120 days. Discussions on parking solutions are also underway.
- Tom Logan shared updates on driver safety training and reported that the team earned third place in a bus roadeo mechanical competition.

RTAP Committee Announcements

• Tom Logan noted challenges with federal grant management due to staffing turnover at the Federal Transit Administration. However, there has been no direct impact on local transit agencies to date.

Together, we worked to provide students with the tools and resources necessary for a safe and enjoyable break.

Distribution of Revenue Hours




